NAPLAN Reports

NAPLAN reports were posted to school last week. Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sat the NAPLAN tests in Term I. We are carefully going through the reports now as we collate our whole school data. NAPLAN reports will be sent home next week.

PISA Testing

Texas has been selected to participate in the Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA). PISA is a sample assessment, and as such, approximately 800 Australian secondary schools have been sampled to participate in PISA 2025. The sample selection process is designed in such a way that ensures there is adequate representation of the states and territories, government, Catholic and independent schools, as well as metropolitan, regional and remote schools.

Students fitting the criteria in Year 10 will spend around 3¾ hours completing a computerbased assessment, including answering questions in one or more of the assessment domains (science, reading, mathematics and learning in a digital world), and answering questions about their home background, aspects of students' lives, such as their attitudes and motivation towards learning, availability and use of ICT.

PISA is an age-based sample, and all students enrolled in school, born between 1 May 2009 and 30 April 2010, regardless of year level, will be eligible to participate in PISA. This means that students involved will be 15-year-olds in Year 10.

The PISA assessment has been scheduled to take place on Tuesday 5 August 2025, commencing at 9:00am.

Buddy Reading

Each Monday we have started a buddy reading system during Smash Up time. Older students will read with the younger students of the school. The year level pairings are as

- Prep with Year 6
- Year I/2 with Year 7
- Year 3 with Year 8
- Year 4 with Year 9
- Year 5 with Year 10

Older year levels join their buddies in the younger year level's classroom, with each group supervised by their form teacher and the Teacher Aides. We had our first week of buddy reading on Monday of this week and it went very well.

Exciting News: \$35,000 Community Grant Secured for Texas Memorial Hall AV Upgrade

The planned upgrades include:

- A large motorised projection screen with remote control

- · A pan-tilt-zoom camera solution to support live-streaming, recording, and flexible multimedia use

These improvements will allow the Hall to better accommodate a range of community events, presentations, school functions, and more. Bringing lasting benefit to the entire Texas community.

In addition to the grant funding, Goondiwindi Regional Council has generously committed to supporting this initiative by providing:

Helping Your Child Navigate Social Media

When your child begins using social media, it's important to understand the risks and support them in using it in healthy ways. Here are some things to keep in mind.

Social media often includes images, videos, and experiences that may not be suitable for young minds. Children may not yet have the emotional maturity to process what they see, which can lead to:

- anxiety, depression, or changes in behaviour
- constantly comparing themselves to others
- low self-esteem and body image concerns

We recommend that parents limit social media use for children under 14. If your child is using social media, be actively involved – monitor their activity, offer support, and place time limits while they develop healthy online habits.

Year 10 Careers Education

In Week 2 of Term 3, our Year 10 students will travel to Stanthorpe State High School as part of their Career Education and SET Planning. This excursion will give students the opportunity to:

- Explore a range of career pathway options
- Build their knowledge at the Careers Market

Later in the year, Stanthorpe State High School will host a Subject Selection Information Evening for students entering Year 11. The evening will begin with a presentation on Senior Secondary schooling and the process of earning a QCE (Queensland Certificate of Education). Students and caregivers will then have the chance to speak with staff and view subject displays to support informed subject selection.

Students in Year 9/10 Ag were luck to see some peanut harvest when they recently went on farm for a visit. Farmer Greg talked them through all the elements of what a harvest

looks like. The students got to pick some peanuts and eat them fresh from the field. The students are finishing off their irrigation systems and have been enjoying the build process.











Year 8 Science

Year 8s Get Hands-On with Gravity Buggies

This term, Year 8 Science students have been putting Newton's laws into action as they conducted their highly anticipated gravity buggy experiments.

As part of their Physics unit, students were challenged to design, build, and test gravity-powered buggies – vehicles that rely on the force of gravity to move, rather than motors or batteries. Using simple materials like cardboard, skewers, wheels, and string, students worked in teams to create buggies that could travel the furthest distance using only a falling weight as their energy source.

Throughout the project, students developed their understanding of key physics concepts such as gravitational potential energy, friction, force, and motion. They made predictions, tested variables like mass and ramp height, and recorded data to measure how different changes affected the performance of their buggies.

The school's hallways became a makeshift test track, full of excitement and scientific thinking. There were moments of triumph (and a few crash landings!), but all were valuable learning opportunities. Students reflected on what worked, what didn't, and how they could improve their designs based on scientific reasoning.



This engaging, hands-on investigation not only brought science to life but also encouraged creativity, problem-solving, and teamwork. Well done to all the Year 8 students for their effort, enthusiasm, and innovation in this exciting experiment!

Year 9 Mathematics

Year 9 Students Dive Into Probability

This term, Year 9 Mathematics students have kicked off their new unit on probability with curiosity, collaboration, and a bit of chance!

The unit began with students exploring **theoretical probability**, learning how to calculate the likelihood of various outcomes in different situations – such as flipping a coin, rolling a die, or selecting a card from a deck. Students quickly discovered how useful fractions, decimals, and percentages are when calculating and comparing probabilities.


To bring the numbers to life, students conducted **real-world probability** experiments. The classroom became a lively lab of learning as students flipped coins, rolled dice, and spun spinners – collecting data and analysing how their experimental results compared to what they expected theoretically.

These hands-on activities helped students deepen their understanding of randomness, fairness, and sample size. Many were surprised to find that real results often varied from expected ones, especially with smaller sample sizes, sparking important discussions about chance, variation, and patterns in data.

As the unit continues, students will apply their knowledge to more complex scenarios and even design their own probability simulations. It's been fantastic to see such enthusiasm, critical thinking, and teamwork from the Year 9s as they develop valuable skills in mathematical reasoning and data analysis.

We can't wait to see what probabilities they'll uncover next!
